PHYSIOTHERAPY

SETTING

Community Health Centre

PATIENT

You are a 40-year-old salesperson who had a mild stroke three weeks ago. You have been referred for physiotherapy but are not sure why, as you feel ready to return to work.

TASK

- When asked, say you feel fine; you have some weakness, a feeling of heaviness and limited movement in your right arm and shoulder, but you're okay. You don't really think you need physiotherapy. In fact, you feel ready to go back to work.
- When asked, say you work in sales so your job does not require a lot of physical exercise, but you do need to do a lot of driving; you feel ready and want to get back to work as soon as possible.
- Say maybe you should wait until your shoulder is a bit better. Ask how long it will take to recover.
- Say you don't really know what the physiotherapy will involve.
- Agree to work with the physiotherapist on an exercise programme.

PHYSIOTHERAPY

SETTING

PHYSIO

You see a 40-year-old salesperson who had a mild left cerebrovascular accident (stroke) three weeks ago, resulting in lack of function of the right shoulder and scapula. The patient has been referred for physiotherapy but is unsure why, as he/she feels ready to return to work.

TASK

- Confirm reason for referral (physiotherapy following mild stroke). Find out how patient has been since stroke.
- Outline benefits of physiotherapy for stroke patients (e.g., gradually building up strength, aiding recovery, etc.). Find out about patient's job (physical demands, any driving, etc.).
- Stress patient is not ready to return to work (e.g., may delay recovery, unsafe to drive, medical clearance required from doctor, etc.).
- Give information about recovery (e.g., dependent on: amount of damage to brain, therapeutic stimulation of muscles, fatigue, commitment, etc.).
- Give information about physiotherapy programme (e.g., goal-based, aim: return to work, etc.). Describe possible exercise types (e.g., strengthening, stretching, etc.). Establish patient's willingness to start exercises.
